

Shop Talk (It's not just about the cars)

There is an advantage to occasionally buying a different Miata. The advantage is that it kindles your interest as you identify improvements you would like to make that enhance its comfort, convenience, or appearance. And so it has been with Ed Walker. As a result, we are collaborating again this month on another Shop Talk Article, covering Ed's latest project to improve his Blue 2006 retractable hardtop. After driving it for a few months, he realized how much he missed the self-dimming mirror that he had in his previous car. As most of us do

these days, Ed went online to see if any other Miata owners had experienced this same sense of loss. More importantly, Ed wanted to know what, if anything, they had done to remedy the problem. As you know, the Internet rarely fails you, and such was the case here. The Internet provided several testimonials from enterprising owners that replaced their old-fashioned manual day/night mirrors with modern, electronic mirrors that are self-dimming. As a bonus, also included were other features such as a compass, ambient temperature, and the granddaddy of all features, a Home link compatible garage door opener. The company that supplies Mazda with original equipment rearview mirrors, Gentex, will sell you any or all their products through their online store. Alternatively, if your online research is thorough enough, you can come away knowing exactly what model mirror you need for your application. Armed with that knowledge, you can go to eBay and find a used mirror at a much lower cost. That is the path that Ed followed. Ed wanted the full boat, auto dimming, garage door opener, temperature, and compass. He needed a model that was original equipment on a Mazda 6. He found one for \$60.00 and it arrived at his home in just a couple of days, including installation instructions.

I helped on most of the project, but I was not there for what Ed describes as the most challenging part: removing the existing mirror from its mount on the windshield. One would envision some sort of set screw that you loosen and then remove the mirror. That is not the case. There is a small, rectangular opening in the base of the mirror into which you insert a little screwdriver and apply considerable pressure to a flat spring inside the base to move the spring out of the way to release the mirror. The

tricks are knowing that the spring is inside the base, knowing which direction you move it to cause the release, and knowing how much pressure you can apply and not break windshield, the difficult to accomplish when you can't see what is inside the base until you get it off. The picture at right, taken after the mirror was removed, will give you an idea what needs to be done.



When I got involved, we decided that the best way to install the wiring needed to power the mirror would be to remove the interior plastic trim that covers both the top of the windshield and the driver's side windshield post. The second step was to run the three wires that power the mirror. Two wires extend from the center of the windshield where the mirror is located to a point about halfway across the top of the driver's side windshield, where they are spliced into designated existing wires. The third wire extends across the top of the windshield and down the driver's side windshield post, and is then fished through an opening at the side of the dash down into the fuse box located near the floor on the driver's side. Ed had also purchased a fuse splitter which allows you to remove a fuse and replace it with the splitter which contains two fuses, each connected to a separate wire which allows you to then run two separate fused lines from one outlet in the fuse box. That device must be connected to a switched line so that when the engine is turned off, the power to mirror will be cut off. We used the accessory fuse for this purpose. Once all three wires were spliced into place, we reassembled everything and tested the mirror's functions. Fortunately, everything worked. The process took about 2 hours, and Ed is well pleased with his new accessories. By the way, the assembly instructions Ed got with the mirror were thorough and easy to understand. Below you will find a few pictures taken during the process and of the mirror in its new home.
