Vice President needed for the Miami Valley Miata Club

The MVMC is currently seeking members to self-nominate for Vice President. 
Location: Randy Mott's Farm, 1350 South Hufford Road, Casstown, Ohio 45312

Shop Talk

It's not just about the Miatas

Cleaning Your Mass Airflow Sensor



On our 2012 NC Miata, we recently started intermittently flashing a P0171 Check Engine Light (CEL) Code. I used our home-version code reader to read the code. The reader also has the ability to reset or erase the CEL. The code reader plugs into the OBDII port which on most vehicles is under the driver's side of the dash. See PIC1 – Code reader and PIC2 – the OBDII

port on an NC Miata. P0171 message is SYSTEM TOO LEAN BANK 1. Lean means

the cylinders are getting too little gas or, more normally, too much air. Remember that your car does not just burn gas, it mixes that gas with air which also gets burned. BANK 1 refers to which side of a V type engine is having the problem. There is only one Bank in a Miata so that is irrelevant in our case.

There are three normal reasons for the P0171 code – a vacuum leak, a bad O2 sensor or a dirty Mass Air Flow device. Many of the CEL code are what I call nuisance codes – meaning that you could probably drive the car normally for years without damage. For nuisance codes like this one, the

first thing I usually do is to erase it and see how soon it comes back. I reset this code and after a few driving cycles, the code came back.

I tried to eliminate the vacuum leak as the problem by checking all vacuum lines visually. Seeing no problems, I started the engine and sprayed starter fluid around the various places where air might be leaking in. If there was a vacuum leak, theoretically, the engine RPM would change noticeably – the RPM would increase due to the addition of fuel being sucked in from the leak area. No such changes were heard.

As it happened, I found an unused can of Mass Airflow Cleaner, so I decided to try that. Starting with a cold engine, locate the Mass Airflow Sensor (MAF). PIC 3 shows the location on an NC Miata. Remove the two Phillips screws holding the MAF. There is an electrical connection that must also be removed. I absolutely hate those things because they are all different – the tabs that must be pushed in are hard to see or hard to locate and sometime impossible to get pressure on. Sometimes you can depress the tabs but cannot exert pressure in the direction to remove it. OK, rant over. There are two tabs on this one – and as usual, I needed other tools to release this electrical connection. Once the screws are out and the electrical connection is broken, the MAF lifts right out.



All instructions I see warn to never touch the inside of the MAF. As you can see from PICS 4-5-6, the working part is some fine wire with electrical continuity, and I assume

it is easily broken. To clean it, just put the part on your workbench and on some paper towels and spray it liberally with the cleaner (PIC 7). They also say do not try to clean it with anything other than MAF cleaner. This MAF cleaner dissipates quickly – so you can just wait a few minutes before carefully returning it to the engine and putting in the two screws and electrical connection. You should not try to dry the part first.

In my case, cleaning the MAF did not fix my P0171 problem so I will be replacing one or both of the O2 sensors soon. As I understand it, there is no specific way to tell which of the sensors is bad. For reference, there is one UPSTREAM O2 sensor on or close to the exhaust manifold and a second one usually on the output side of the catalytic converter.

Replacing one or both of those sounds like something for a future article!

BONUS INFORMATION:

If you happen to be a "tool guy" like many of us, you have bought a tool and then never

used it. Here is one I bought last year at Harbor Freight that I have used a surprising number of times over the year. These long-nosed pliers (PIC 8) with the bent nose have been extra helpful when detaching electrical connections especially. I recommend them highly.
